MATHS MANIA!

On 6th May the Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III will take place at Westminster Abbey. This is a perfect time to do some maths. Why not try some of these ideas.

- Make a crown and decorate it with 2D shapes (square, circle, triangle)
- Think about the date, 06.05.23. What do these numbers represent? Find objects outside that represent the date eg. 6 leaves, 5 flowers and 23 stones.
- Create a Coronation timeline.

- Find out what the most popular monarch's name is. Can you make a graph?



PHSE and RE

Our Jigsaw theme this term is "Healthy Me!" We are learning about keeping our bodies and minds strong and healthy. We will learn about keeping ourselves safe at home and out and about. We will find out about eating healthily and how what we eat affects our bodies. We are getting ready for HEALTHY WEEK starting week beginning 5th June!

Discovery RE

This half term **Year 1** will be finding out about Shabbat and why it is so important to Jewish children and families.

Year 2 will be discovering how going to the Mosque helps Muslim people feel that they belong

Year 3 Will be studying Hinduism and finding out how Hindus believe Brahman can be everywhere

Year 4 investigate how often and where Muslims pray and why this is so important to them.

Outdoor Transformation

We've got some exciting developments underway in our Foundation outdoor area and they link perfectly with our current learning: what lives outside our classroom?

Our outdoor area has a large area of grass, or should I say mud! Over winter it often has to be taped off as it just becomes a slippy mess so...

Rather than fighting against the mud we are turning the area into a garden with raised beds. Miss Baker and Mr Tims have organised fencing, beds and gardening equipment. The children will be in charge of the planting and growing! This



follows our EYFS curriculum learning about the natural world. We know children will have the opportunity to observe changes, draw, compare plants, harvest and over time watch how the garden changes through the seasons. Super Spotters

We made an exciting spot last week, the first swift of the season flying high in the sky. Swifts, swallows and house martins are amazing little birds. They don't live here all year long, they spend winter in Africa and then fly here for the summer.



The migration route of our swifts is an epic adventure from eastern Africa all the way to the UK and back again. This journey is part of a flyway used by millions of birds every year, including other familiar migratory species, like swallows and cuckoos. But swifts are just a little bit special. Not only do they do this journey without ever landing, but they can also travel super-fast, zipping along at speeds of almost 70 mph.

Swift Facts

Swifts build their nests high up in the roof space under the eaves of houses. The nest is built by both adults out of any material that can be



gathered on the wing, including feathers, paper, straw, hay and seeds. It is cemented together with their saliva and they are reused year after year.

Look into the sky and see if you can spot any swifts, swallows, house martins or you can look on houses for their nests. If you have any super spots email them to <u>superspotters@damers.</u> <u>dorset.sch.uk</u>.

Year 2 at the Pond

Year 2 have really enjoyed going pond dipping. After reading all about Bog Baby, we thought we would go and look in the school pond to see what life we could find or whether there were any Bog Babies swinging amongst the grass. There was much excitement over identifying what had been caught - tadpoles, worms and water boatman were some of the things identified. Some were even lucky enough to see a frog!



Year 2 are also excited to share their new pledge - we are planning to grow sunflower seeds and support local pollinators. We are planning to grow our seeds in repurposed pots which would have been making their way into your recycling bin. We can't wait to see the sunflowers grow!

No Mow May

The 10 most common plants recorded during the No Mow May campaign last year were daisies, creeping buttercup, yellow rattle, common bird's-foot trefoil, field forget-me-



not, meadow buttercup, white clover, common mouse-ear, oxeye daisy and dandelion.

People are mowing their lawns less as the trend for neat gardens is becoming less popular.

This May there is a very easy thing you can do in your garden to help wild flowers and struggling pollinators too. Put your lawnmowers away for No Mow May. Whether it's a small patch or your whole lawn, you can have an impact. Leaving the grass uncut will create a habitat that will benefit bees and other insects. At the end of May record your results <u>on their website</u> of the number of wildflowers you find in your lawn. On a single day in summer, one acre of wildflower meadow can contain 3 million flowers and produce 1 kg of nectar sugar for pollinators.

Dorchester to Poundbury Cycle Route

Thank you to everyone who filled out our questionnaire. Here are the results:



- 81% said they would use the route other than the school run
- 72% said they would use a cycle lane to get to Poundbury
- 65% of children cycle in Dorchester
- 46% would use the route daily, 29% would use it twice a week
- 56% adults cycle in Dorchester
- 68% cycle elsewhere

Giles Watts of Dorchester Transport Action Group is supporting our campaign and we have a meeting with him on Monday 15th May.

We wrote an email to Jason Bowerman, Duchy Estate Manager who is in support of a safe cycle lane/route between Dorchester and Poundbury.

We also wrote an email to Chris Peck, Head of Highways at Dorset Council where we are in discussions with him about the lane/route.

We have been invited to a workshop to discuss our campaign further with Chris, Giles and local Dorset Councillors at the end of May. We will keep you up to date with what happens next.

Power Down Day



Damers Eco Crew have been focusing on reducing the schools energy consumption. Since September we set a target of reducing our energy consumption by 10% each month which we have met so far. We use a programme called <u>Energy Sparks</u> that helps us to analyse how much energy we are using.

We organised a power down day with the money saved going into a pot and classes who have powered down correctly could put a proposal into having some of the money for new equipment, money towards a school trip, or an educational workshop. "Keep Powering Down Keep Getting Rewards" is our slogan. Foundation and Year 1 went above and beyond claiming £50 Amazon vouchers each to be spent across each year group.

We have designed a poster with Nick Morris from Wallis on Poundbury and hope to launch the poster in all classrooms and offices over the next few weeks to remind classes and staff what they need to turn off before they go home.

During the Easter Holidays we turned everything off and saved 60% of our energy Consumption, saving £350.
