Wishing you a wonderful half term and see you back on Monday 19th February.



Big Plastic Count 2024, 11th - 17th March

The Whole School will be taking part in the National Big Plastic Count. There was a Big Plastic Count in 2022 where they found out that recycling is now enough and that we need to reduce or find alternatives for the plastic we use and what is being produced. Fruit and vegetables wrapped in plastic were the highest amount of plastic counted.

We will encourage you with your child to count the plastic you throw away using a tally sheet at home. A special link will be sent to you via the school office and on your class blog so you can register your data. We will also be able to see the progress across each class in the school and how much plastic is being thrown away. We will be able to work out classes' carbon footprint and the whole school. The figures will be shared with the Government by Greenpeace UK and Everyday Plastic. This quick film will tell you more about how the Big Plastic Count Works

Terracycle (an email is going out to parents about this)

We will no longer be collecting Confectionary wrappers or toothpaste tubes and brushes. Terracycle has decided to stop the programme. They have advised people to look at the wrappers for recycling information.

below to find out what we can recycle. All the money raised goes back into our environmental projects. Items include crisp packets, biscuit, cake wrappers, printing toners and cartridges, coffee pods, water filters, stationary equipment like pens and highlighters that do not work anymore.

The top spot certainly goes to William in G4 who spotted the sparrow hawk who had just caught a small bird. We found his eating spot in the shrubs by the double garage where you can see little piles of feathers. Bad news for the sparrows but an exciting discovery for us.

Oly Rush from Charity Project Planet Earth came to speak to Year 1 about Plastic Pollution and how we can help protect our oceans.

Oly spoke about his swimming challenges that raise money for his charity. He is in The Guinness Book of World Records 2024 as the first person to Swim around the Caribbean Island of Grand Cayman non stop. He swam the 60 mile distance in 36hrs 59mins. He has also swam the Jurassic Coast from Exmouth, Devon to Highcliffe Dorset and swam around the Isle of Wight.



Oly organises regular Litterpicks every month around Dorset but mostly at Ringstead Bay that you can take part in with an adult. All the equipment needed is provided that includes litter pickers, gloves, and bags. It is free to take part. Please go along and support Oly's work. Year 2 have loved our theme this term - Why should we protect the polar regions? We've created polar landscapes, found out all about the adaptations animals and people have made to living in these freezing habitats, made our own sugar cube igloos and experimented with 'polar bear blubber' and ice cubes in science! We were also privileged to talk to a marine geologist on Zoom all about his trips to Antarctica and his research on melting ice caps.

What a brilliant half term we've had in Year 3. In our science learning we've been exploring forces and magnetism, starting with contact and non-contact forces. We then moved on to think about gravity and the opposite force of upthrust which can be caused by solids, liquids or gases preventing everything from being pulled towards the centre of the earth.



Our favourite learning in this topic has to be exploring magnets. We've thought about which materials are magnetic and which aren't and explored the question why aren't all metals magnetic? There are some great experiments to be done at home if you'd like to continue your learning.




Year 4 News

In literacy, we've worked incredibly hard in writing challenges and enjoying our book 'When the Mountains Roared' following the adventure of Ruby from Australia to India!







Base News
